

MEET DAVE GARCIA

Where did the PC send you and what did you do there?

I served in Kenya From 1988 to 1990....I worked at a rural Technical School called a Polytechnic, in Kianjai Meru located about 160 miles north of Nairobi. I was sent as a Metal Shop Teacher and worked with other shop teachers (Carpenters, Masons, Taylors, Agriculture Instructors) teaching young women and men ages 16 to 20. Besides teaching I was able to collect over 350 donated technical books and started a library. I also ended up writing grants for school and shop supplies, organized the drilling of a Bore hole for fresh water in my village. and was able to join other NGO groups in their initiatives.

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There was no access to fresh water at our school or in the neighboring village. Most of it was taken from streams or caught in gutters on the roofs and contained in cisterns. I was very lucky during my travels around the country to meet a Danish Volunteer who was drilling experimental water wells in the middle of the Kenyan desert, believe it or not. I mentioned the lack of water resources in my village and told him if he ever was in the neighborhood we sure could use him. A month or so later he and his crew showed up and proceed to drill a 6 inch Bore Hole 150 meters deep right on the school grounds.

When the well was complete and we started pumping fresh water, a large group of villagers, kids, women students stood close, amazed at the "magic fresh water" being pumped out of the ground. I will always remember picking up the huge hose and turning it on crowdI thoroughly soaked everyone, they laughed, and danced......it was like a broken fire hydrant in Brooklyn NY in mid Summer.

What was the biggest challenge you faced as a Volunteer?

Like many Volunteers around the world it was probably just staying safe. The roads in Kenya were really dangerous in those days, traveling in busses large and small was particularly scarry. I lived in the mountains and narrowly escaped a bus accident that could have been fatal..

We had to worry about malaria, thieves, dysentery, rabies.....felt like I was back in the U. S, Marine Corps!

What song will instantly transport you back to your country of service?

"Hakuna Matata" from the Lion King......In Swahili Hakuna Matata means..." No Problem". Everywhere you went, when ever you asked someone how they were doing the response was "Hakuna Matata".

Most Kenyan's were easy going, hard working people, with a pleasant outlook. I guess you could say that would go for most of the poorer people in the developing world...Hakuna Matata!

The Fair Trade Market is contemplating going online ... just in time for the holidays!


